

# Guide to reference format for EEB2245W (based on format used by the journal *Evolution*)

General format: references should use a hanging indent and be arranged alphabetically. Also note the punctuation. Most boxed elements are separated by periods.

1st author is listed with last name first, then comma, then initials

2nd and subsequent authors are listed with initials first. All authors should be listed.

Publication year. (If there are online and print publication dates, use the print one.)

Article title (not capitalized)

Journal title (abbreviated and in title case, so important words are capitalized. Abbreviations are standardized; this means that if you see a journal title abbreviated in one of your sources, then the same abbreviation should work for you. This is usually the easiest way to figure out the abbreviation. More information is available at <http://www.library.uiuc.edu/biotech/j-abbrev.html>)

Volume number in which the article was published

Page range of article; note that some online only journals (e.g., PloS, BMC) give a single number rather than page range

doi address: the digital object identifier provides a permanent electronic address.
